CalWORKs Housing Support Program Referral Request

If someone in your immediate family is approved for the CalWORKs program and meets one of the definitions of homelessness below, you may be eligible to the CalWORKs Housing Support Program (CW HSP).

Some of the services provided under the CW HSP may include, but are not limited to:

- Case Management
- Assistance with applications, credit check fees, criminal background checks
- Assistance with correcting credit reports
- Assistance with transportation for housing search and landlord interviews
- Childcare when parent(s) is/are searching for housing or meeting with potential landlords
- Budgeting classes
- Tenancy education
- Housing placement assistance
- Assistance with move-in costs (deposit, rent, and/or utility connection fees)
- Temporary ongoing rental subsidies determined on a case by case basis

The CW HSP is a supportive service of the CalWORKs program. The Rights and Responsibilities you read and agreed to by signing the SAWS 2A SAR Rights & Responsibilities form are inclusive to all CalWORKs supportive services. Approval or denial of your application will not affect your eligibility to CalWORKs.

As part of your application process, there will be a housing barrier assessment and not all families will be granted services through the Housing Support Program. It is very important that your contact information (mailing address and/or phone number) be current and reliable at all times. Loss of contact such as returned mail or inability to reach you by phone may cause your eligibility to CW HSP to be denied or supportive services to be reduced or suspended.
